PROCLAMATION

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS COME – GREETINGS:

WHEREAS: Cities across the Nation have been plagued by numerous problems associated with alcohol, tobacco, and other forms of drug abuse, leading to the United States Congress's establishment of the Red Ribbon Campaign in 1988 to encourage drug-free lifestyles and involvement in drug-abuse-prevention efforts; and

WHEREAS: The red ribbon was chosen as a symbol commemorating the work of Enrique Kiki Camarena, an agent of the Drug Enforcement Administration, who was murdered in the line of duty. The red ribbon has come to represent the belief that one person CAN make a difference; and

WHEREAS: There is hope of winning the war on drugs, and that hope lies in the hard work and determination of people in our communities to create a drug-free environment. Success will not occur overnight, but our patience and continued commitment to drug education and prevention is imperative; and

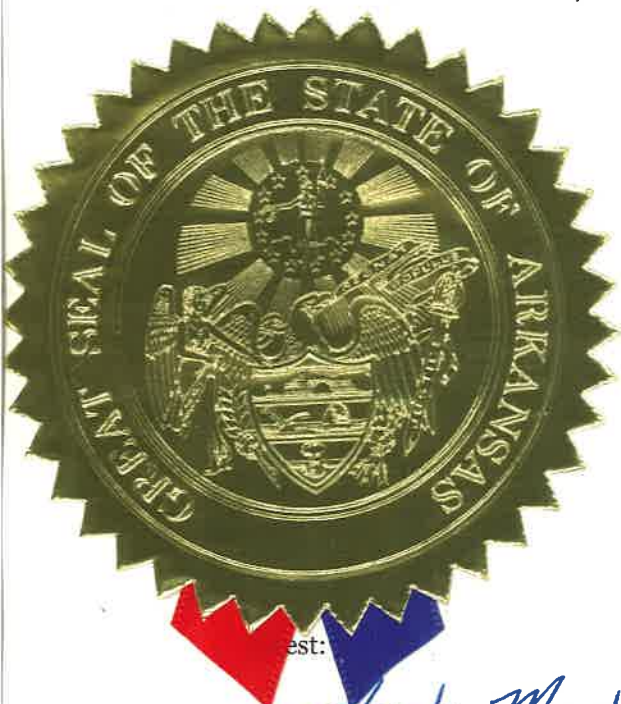
